



## FIRST DAY.

CARSON CITY (Monday), January 3, 1881.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and Statute, the Assembly was called to order at 12 m. by the Hon. Jasper Babcock, Secretary of State.

The roll was called and the following members-elect answered to

Since then the construction of railroads has rendered traveling to the Capital comparatively easy, and less expensive to the representatives of the State from the counties along the line of such railroads; but there are a large number of counties in the eastern part of the State which have no such facilities for traveling, being compelled to rely on the old expensive system of The representatives from these counties, by reason of distance, are compelled to devote their whole time to the performance of their duties as legislators, while those from the western part of the State are enabled, by conveniences known to all, to return to their homes every afternoon and devote a portion of their time to private affairs.

Your minority, however, recognizes the importance of practicing rigid economy in all departments of the State Government, and appreciates the motives of the committee in their recommendations in regard to this bill, but in my judgment I do not believe the necessities of the case demand such a reduction. Twenty cents per mile will not pay the actual traveling expenses of a large number of the members from the eastern counties, and in consideration of that fact I recommend the striking out of "twenty cents," and insert in lieu

thereof "twenty-five cents." Respectfully submitted,

Your Committee on State Prison affairs, in concert with a committee from the Senate, have had under consideration the present management of the State Prison of Nevada as evidenced by the condition of the buildings, the prisoners and the accounts, and beg

leave to report as follows:

That we have examined the Biennial Report of the Warden of the State Prison for the years 1879 and 1880; that we have verified the same, and that we have found it to compare favorably with the report of former years in most all respects. Also, that the expense per capita compares favorably with the reports of other State Prisons. when taking our present isolated position into consideration. We have examined thoroughly into the system of discipline, the number and disposition of the guards, and the methods of punishment; into all that relates to the commissary and medical departments, to the enforcement of hard labor in the stone quarry and to the operations of the several industries. We have found that the prisoners are treated in a humane manner; that they are well provisioned and well clothed; that the medical advice furnished them is equal to the best that the profession of the county affords. We have found all books, records and accounts to be correct. The manufacture and sale of boots and shoes, which has become a business of scarcely any or no profit, might be carried on more profitably than has been done during the past two years. The factory is an excellent stone structure built by convict labor under the direction of the present Full service is exacted of the free paid agents of the State employed in the prison. The precautions for the safe keeping of criminals are thorough and efficient. One attempt was made to fire the prison, but was promptly thwarted. Our investigation into all of the above matters has included the taking of testimony relating thereto. The guards, prisoners, attachés and officers have spoken alike in favorable terms of the good government of C. C. Batterman during his Wardenship. Which is the report of your Committee.

To the Honorable the Assembly:

I have the honor to return herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 65, entitled "An Act to protect the State Treasury." The provisions of this bill I am forced to regard as inimical to the best interests of the State, and if enacted into law, liable to involve great complications. Under existing laws, commissions having supervision of the management of the State Prison and Orphans' Home, care of the insane, State printing, etc., are established. These commissions are composed of officers of the State Government. expenditures made are subject to the approval of these several boards, and are thereafter passed upon by the Board of Examiners. Finally, if approved by that Board, they are still subject to objection and disapproval by the State Controller. It would seem that all necessary safeguards are thus thrown around the disbursements of the public funds. Under our State Constitution and existing laws, no money in excess of a specific appropriation can be paid out, nor is any State officer or commission of State officers authorized to contract and bind the State in excess of any appropriation. All such contracts, if made, can only be valid when confirmed by the ensuing Legislature. Under the provisions of this bill, in the not unusual event of an insufficient appropriation for the support of the State Prison, Orphans' Home or the insane, no course would be left to the officers in charge but to turn loose the convicts and throw unprotected orphans upon the charity of the public. Not an insane person could be sent to Stockton or elsewhere by the State after the appropriation became exhausted. Not a pound of flour, not a stick of fuel could be purchased, for this bill not only declares that for articles so furnished the indebtedness incurred shall not constitute a valid claim against the State, but that the officer or commission of officers purchasing or contracting such indebtedness in excess of an appropriation shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to fine and imprisonment. It seems improbable that the effect of this bill has been made apparent to its author and supporters. Emergencies may arise whereby the appropriation made for a specific purpose must be exhausted long before the assembling of the Legislature. Under this bill, if approved, provision for all possible contingencies must be made by the appropriation of sums largely in excess of ordinary and probable needs. This, in my judgment, would be unwise and tend to extravagance. For the reasons herein set forth, and many others of similar nature not necessary to detail here, I am reluctantly constrained to withhold my assent to the bill.

Mr. Speaker:

Your Committee on Corporations and Railroads, to whom has been referred Assembly Bill No. 46, "An Act relating to railroads the termini of which are within the State of Nevada," and also the resolution in connection therewith introduced by Mr. Waldorf January 24, 1881, a copy of which is hereto annexed marked "Exhibit A," beg leave to report that they have had the same under consideration, and in conformity with said resolution, have made the investigation and examination called for by this Act; that on the 27th day of January, 1881, they caused a notice to be issued to the Nevada Central Railway Company, the Eureka and Palisade Railroad Company, the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company, the Carson and Colorado Railroad Company, and Central Pacific Railroad Company, a copy of which is hereto annexed marked "Exhibit B;" that on the 27th of January, 1881, the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company notified your committee that they were ready to comply with the request contained in their said notice. We respectfully refer you to their letter of January 27, 1881, hereto annexed marked "Exhibit C." We also refer you to the letter of the Eureka and Palisade Railroad Company dated January 29, 1881, hereto annexed marked "Exhibit D; also to the letter of the. Nevada Central Railway Company, dated January 31, 1881, hereto annexed marked "Exhibit E;" also to telegram bearing date February 3, 1881, of C. W. Hinchcliffe, Secretary of the Nevada Central Railway Company, hereto annexed marked "Exhibit F;" also telegram of our Chairman dated February 3, 1881, a copy of which is hereto annexed marked "Exhibit G."

We further beg leave to report that we have examined the several statements of the above-mentioned companies filed with the Secretary of State, true copies of which are hereto annexed, marked "Exhibits

H, I, J, K, and L."

We have also caused to appear before us witnesses for examination upon the subject matter of said resolution and Assembly Bill No. 46, for the purpose of inquiring into the feasibility and expediency of recommending the adoption of the provisions contained in the said bill, or recommending the passage of some law modifying the now existing laws prescribing the maximum rates of fares and freights to be charged by railroad companies within this State.

The witnesses who have appeared before us and have been examined are P. Everts, Superintendent of the Eureka and Palisade Railroad Company; C. W. Hinchcliffe, Secretary of the Nevada

Central Railway Company; H. M. Yerington, Superintendent of the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company, and D. A. Bender, General Freight Agent. The said witnesses were duly sworn to testify in the said matter by your committee, and notes of their testimony are to be found hereto annexed and marked "Exhibit M."

Your committee have also examined the books of account and other books used by the Nevada Central Railway and the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Companies; also, into the charges made by all of the said companies for freights and fares, and other documents relating to that subject, and beg leave to refer you to "Exhibits N, O, P and Q." Citizens of this State not interested in the management and conduct of railroad companies have also appeared before us for the purpose of giving us any and all information throwing light upon the subject under investigation, and to these parties your committee has extended the privilege to propound questions to the several witnesses, of which they have availed themselves.

And we do here state that the examination made has been most thorough and searching, and the several witnesses have made full and unequivocal answers to all questions.

In no case have any of the companies mentioned made charges greater than the maximum rates allowed by law.

The Nevada Central Railway charges for through freight a small fraction below twenty cents per ton per mile, and as low as ten cents per ton per mile, and for passenger fares nearly ten cents per mile, as will appear by reference to "Exhibit O."

We find that in two instances the said company has made special rates, which they claim have been made in San Francisco, viz: They charge upon all through freight carried by them to Grantsville \$4 per one hundred pounds, and to Belmont \$4 10 per one hundred pounds.

The Eureka and Palisade Railroad Company charges for through freight a fraction over eighteen cents per ton per mile, and as low as five and one-half cents per ton per mile, and for passengers a fraction below ten cents per mile.

The Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company charges for through freight as high as fifteen and one-half cents per ton per mile, and as low as eight cents per ton per mile.

Some changes have been made in the regular freight tariff, of all of which due notice has been given, as required by law, as will be found by reference to "Exhibit P."

Upon one class of articles only does the said company charge the full rate of twenty cents per ton per mile, viz: gunpowder.

The highest passenger fare charged by the company is about seven and one-half cents per mile.

During the past year the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company has carried freight amounting to over 343,000 tons.

A great part of the freight so carried by them consisted of

materials and supplies to be used, and used in, and for the construction of the road of the Carson and Colorado Company.

These materials so carried were charged against that company, in the same manner as freight for other persons carried upon their road, except that the rates for carrying such materials were charged by the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company against the Carson and Colorado Railroad Company at lower figures by at least one-half

than rates charged to others.

Under the law of February 12, 1879, an Act entitled "An Act to prevent discrimination in fares and freights by railroad companies, whose railroads run through the State of Nevada, or by railroad companies, the terminus or termini of whose railroads are within the State of Nevada," the railroad companies are permitted to charge lower rates of freight than to the general public when they are engaged in the transportation of materials and supplies for the construction of other railroads within the State. (See Section 9 of said Act.)

According to the statement filed by the Nevada Central Railway Company, and their books, we find the amount paid out by it to be \$996,790 19; the amount expended for operating the road from the first day of March to the thirty-first of December, 1880 (which is the period of time it has existed previous to 1881), to be \$106,477 66; the amount received for transportation, etc., was \$108,484 79, and

the net profits for the same period, \$2,007 13.

By reason of mishaps occurring on the road, damaging the track and road-bed, the expenses were somewhat higher than they will be hereafter; but we are informed, and the witness so testified, that it will take but little short of \$10,000 per month for operating expenses upon that road.

The average freight charge during the past ten months, exclusive of the company's freight, was fifteen and three-tenths cents per

ton per mile.

The length of this road is 93 miles.

From the statement filed by the Eureka and Palisade Railroad Company, it appears that the amount expended for construction, etc., was \$1,556,616 73.

Amount received for transportation, etc., was \$444,552 38.

The current expenses for operating the road for the past year, \$196,299 44. The total profits were \$248,232 94, being a fraction over fifteen per cent. upon the investment during the past year.

The length of this road is 90 miles.

From the annual report of the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company it appears that \$4,856,042 25 were expended for construction; of this, over \$1,000,000 were advanced by the counties of Storey and Ormsby, and mining companies, consequently leaving the expenses for construction actually paid out by the company at about \$3,500,000. We have had no means of satisfying ourselves on this subject, as they claim their books are burnt. The amount received by it for transportation, etc., during the past year, is

\$1,124,300 32. The amount expended by it during the same period, for operating expenses, was \$674,553 38.

The apparently high figures charged upon their annual report by this company led your committee to make a most thorough and searching examination in reference to the items, classed by the company under operating expenses, and to that end we have examined the books and monthly statements of this company and found, after such investigation, that the amount so charged has been actually expended in and about the operating of the said road during the twelve months ending on the thirty-first of December, 1880. They have also found that no moneys for construction were expended by the said company during the past year.

The amount charged is for station service, train service, locomotive service, telegraph service, water service, repair of cars, track, engines, bridges, buildings, tunnels and fences, for stationery, printing, advertising, loss and damage to freight, damages to persons and property, taxes paid during the year, teaming, loading, legal expense and

sundries.

The length of this road is 52 miles and a fraction.

The net profits of the said company, as shown in their statement during the past year, were \$449,746 94, being about  $9\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. upon their investment of \$4,000,000, as shown by said statement, or about 13 per cent. upon the investment of \$3,500,000, after deducting the sums of money advanced by the several counties and mining companies as above stated.

Your committee has caused notice to be given in the newspapers that all persons who had any grievance against any railroad company within this State should appear before the committee, at its stated

meeting, and present the same to them.

No complaints have been made to the committee by any person or persons, as against any of the railroad companies above mentioned in represent the way the result is a superior of the railroad companies above mentioned

in respect to over-charges or discrimination.

The Carson and Colorado Railroad being in the course of construction, and not yet engaged in transporting passengers or freights, we did not examine into its affairs.

We notified the Central Pacific Railroad Company of our meet-

ings, but have received no reply from it.

Upon comparison of the annual reports of the Nevada Central Railway Company, the Eureka and Palisade Railroad Company, and the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company, we find that there is a marked difference between the maximum charges made by each of those companies, the Nevada Central verging on twenty cents per ton per mile, the Eureka and Palisade Railroad Company on nineteen cents per ton per mile, and the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company a little less than fifteen and one-half cents per ton per mile.

These maximum charges are made by the companies upon what they call first-class freights, which they explain to be general merchandise, carried in so-called box-cars, all such merchandise being classed by them under the head of first-class freight, and no distinction made as between silks, clothing, dry goods and other goods. From the tariffs hereto attached, you will perceive that other articles, such as flour, grain, wood, lumber, iron, salt, ores, etc., are carried at much lower figures. Each company having a tariff of its own in reference to such goods, differing somewhat in price from the other,

to which tariffs we respectfully refer you.

We do not incorporate in our report any statement or items in reference to passenger traffic upon the three roads in question, because, from our investigation, we conclude that that branch of the business cuts scarcely any figure in the revenues and earnings of those companies, that is to say, with the Nevada Central and the Eureka and Palisade Railroad Companies the receipts from the passengers at present fall below the expenses of the running of the passenger trains, and the receipts of the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company for passengers a little more than cover the expenses of running the passenger trains.

The expenses for operating the several railroads, as charged by the companies upon their respective annual statements, and which compare with their books, seem almost exorbitant, but each item, how-

ever, is properly accounted for, and found to be legitimate.

It may be a question whether or not the expenses cannot be reduced upon all the railroads, and the same still be properly managed and operated, and thus the net earnings of the several companies assume larger proportions. We respectfully submit this question to the consideration of the Assembly.

In the short time allotted to your committee for investigation, they have worked diligently, earnestly and faithfully, to obtain information from any and all sources, to assist them in their deliberations upon the subject matter under investigation—nothing that lay in their power

to gain such information has been left undone.

We have gathered all the facts which we have deemed best calculated to aid the Honorable Assembly in a fair investigation of the matters called for by the resolution above referred to. The briefness of time has precluded us from going into greater details, yet we are confident that nothing has escaped our attention that could assist us or have any bearing upon the matter called for in the resolution, and in properly carrying out the instructions of the Honorable Assembly, nor have we met with any opposition from any quarter to a fair and impartial inquiry into the subject of freight and passenger charges and expenses of the railroads, the termini of which are within this State.

All information gained, and facts so gathered by us, we have laid

before you in detail in this report.

While acting under the resolution referred to, we have had under consideration Assembly Bill No. 46, and Assembly Bill No. 88—this later bill, which seeks to amend Section Fifty-one of the Act of 1865, in reference to railroad corporations, discriminates between narrow-gauge and wide-guage railroads, permitting the former to charge two

cents more per ton per mile for freight than the latter, and one cent

more per mile for passengers.

Our investigations have shown us, and the Honorable Assembly will observe by a reading of this report and a comparison of the exhibits annexed thereto, that the cost of construction and the cost of operating a railroad, and the cost of the necessary stock, is greater upon wide-gauge railroads than upon narrow-gauge railroads. We therefore cannot perceive why a narrow-gauge railroad should be more favored by legislation than the other, and upon what principle it can be reconciled that the more expensive institution should be granted smaller emoluments than the one whose actual cost and expenses are less.

Aside from this, we do not believe that the proposed legislation (referring to Assembly Bill No. 88) would bear inspection in the courts of law, being unequal in its provisions as to subjects of the

same character.

In reference to Assembly Bill No. 46, we are not prepared to say whether its provisions are or are not feasible or expedient at the present time, and upon all the facts in relation to this subject which we have herein presented, respectfully report the same back without recommendation, believing that the Honorable Assembly, in its just wisdom, aided by the information we have now laid before it, will take such action thereon as will be most beneficial to the people of this State.

Your Committee of the Whole, who have had under consideration Senate Bill No. 69, "An Act to provide for the taking care of the insane of the State of Nevada," have carefully considered the same and beg leave to report the same back to the House with amendments and recommend that it do pass as amended.

By leave the following minority report was presented:

Mr. Speaker:

The undersigned, the minority of your Committee on Corporations and Railroads, to whom was referred Assembly Bill No. 46, "An Act relating to railroads the termini of which are within the State of Nevada;" also, the resolution of Mr. Waldorf relating to said matter, beg leave to report that he differs with the majority of the committee for the following reasons:

First—The majority report places the cost of construction of the Virginia and Truckee Railroad at \$4,856,042 25, when, according to

20

the evidence of the officers of said road, there is no record of the amount of capital stock paid in, and no positive testimony that any portion of it was ever paid in, it being claimed by the company that

their books were destroyed by fire.

Second—In the matter of freight tariffs the agents of said company admitted that, having other freight to carry, they could afford to carry the freight for the Carson and Colorado Railroad Company at one-half the rates charged to the general public. If, on any conditions, they could afford to carry freight for any party at half rates, their present full rates must appear to be too high, and I believe that the present rates for freight are higher than they should be. I do not understand the testimony to be that the receipts of the regular passenger trains have not more than paid the running expenses, but I understand that all trains, including local trains, run as much for the convenience of the company as for the traveling public, the expenses have not more than covered the receipts.

My belief is, that the passenger fares on all regular trains can be

placed at lower rates with profit to the company.

From the testimony of C. W. Hinchcliffe of the Nevada Central Railway, it appears that freight for points beyond Austin (the terminus) is carried over that road at less rates than to Austin, in plain violation of an Act passed by the Legislature of Nevada, approved February 12, 1879.

I fully coincide with the report of the majority of the committee

in relation to the affairs of the Eureka and Palisade Railroad.

In conclusion, I would recommend that either Assembly Bill No. 46, by amending it, or some bill similar in its provisions, be passed by this Legislature, to the end that the railroad corporations of this State may be compelled to do justice to a long-suffering people, and to learn them that they are not above the law-making power of the State. First—That he was opposed to appropriations for building while

our State was suffering under the present financial depression.

Second—The passage of this bill extends the present high contract of Langdon & Clark for sixteen months, and possibly longer, while responsible parties offer to contract for the keeping of our insane within our own State for a much less sum, ranging from five to six dollars per week per capita, which offer this House has failed to consider.

Mr. Coffin arose to explain his vote, and said that he voted against the bill for the reason that the State was not in a financial condition to make an appropriation of eighty thousand dollars for building purposes, and for the further reason that the bill provides for the keeping of our unfortunate insane patients in the State of California until July 1, 1882, at a cost of seven dollars per week, while many responsible citizens of Nevada have offered to keep them at rates ranging from five dollars to six dollars and fifty cents per week, and that the bids of such citizens of Nevada remain before the Assembly unconsidered, and changed his vote in order to move for a reconsideration of the vote, under the rules of the House.

Mr. Ernst concurred in the Speaker's explanation, and changed

his vote to give notice of a reconsideration.

At 1:54 P. M. Mr. Smyth moved to adjourn.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR.

STATE OF NEVADA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CARSON CITY, February 19, 1881.

To the Honorable the Assembly:

I have the honor to return herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 43, "An Act to authorize fees and salaries of officers to be taken in attachment and execution, and to prohibit assignments to defraud creditors." It has been the policy of all governments to

protect their officers from any such interference as would or could render it difficult or impossible for them to discharge their duties. The Supreme Court of the United States and the higher courts of the several States in the Union have, in cases wherein this principle was involved, uniformly ruled against the provisions of this bill. The Constitution of this State recognizes the same principle, i. e., the impolicy of permitting interference by civil process with its officers, by providing that "members of the Legislature shall be privileged from arrest on civil process during the session of the Legislature and for fifteen days before the commencement of each session." I am led to believe, moreover, that the bill would be inoperative, and result only in annoyances and hindrances to the disbursing officers of the State and the several counties, without effecting the end sought to be attained. The majority of State and county officers are mainly dependent upon their salaries, not only for support, but for their efficiency as such officers, and it must be apparent that to subject them to persecution from personal or other motives would and must severely interfere with and hamper the public service. For the foregoing reasons I must refuse my assent to this bill.

Third—I am satisfied my constituents do not want this road, unless they are given first-mortgage bonds of the road, which the projectors

of this road are unwilling to give.

Fourth—The projectors of this road are also unwilling to submit the proposition to the qualified electors of White Pine County, which fact, in my opinion, is conclusive evidence that there is a job in the scheme.

Fifth—For the sake of competition the people of White Pine are unwilling to pay a high rate of interest on two hundred thousand dollars of bonds for ten years, without any of the guarantees herein set forth. I am opposed to subsidies to corporations.


