My objections are as follows: This proposed bill is an attempt to make new and strange requirements for the locating, prospecting and establishing valid, lode and placer mining claims, which is inconsistent and subversive to the mining laws of the United States now in force, and the rights of miners of each mining district to make regulations not in conflict with United States mining laws governing the location, manner of recording, amount of work necessary and the manner in which it is to be performed in order to hold necessarion of mining claims. Also the more it is to be performed in order to hold possession of mining claims. Also, the manner of locating placer claims as defined in this bill would be in direct contravention

ner of locating placer claims as defined in this bill would be in direct contravention and in violation of the laws of the United States governing the same by substituting in this bill the word "acres" instead of "feet."

The provisions of the whole bill is intended, to my mind, and is embodied in the last portion of the title, "and for other purposes," which means the promotion and the causing of endless litigation, if approved, over questions which have already been so well established in our courts, and are generally understood by miners and prospectors; and any interference with them would, in my judgment, lead to confusion and trouble. Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly:

I rise to nominate our present Senator, a gentleman whose twenty-four years of eminent service in the Senate of the United States "has won golden opinions from all sorts of people." For his fidelity to the special interests of the State, the purple

toga has been placed upon his shoulders for four successive terms.

True, he has always been returned to the Senate as a Republican by the Republican party of the State. It was his pride to be a member of that great political organization. He had seen it use its mighty strength to break the chains of bondage. He had watched it struggling through the wilderness of reconstruction; had been an active participant in all its great achievements, and had shared the dishad been an active participant in all its great achievements, and had shared the disappointments of its reverses; a sagacious adviser in its councils, a zealous supporter of all its measures of reform. But when that great political organization departed from the wholesome traditions of the fathers, when, as a climax to its perfidy, it set up the golden calf and prostrated itself before it, then, gentlemen, his thoughts reverted to the people of his State, and his generous heart rebelled. And so he turned his face toward the rugged mountain of the law, and with patience, zeal and intravidity wended his way toward the source of truth and righteousness. intrepidity wended his way toward the source of truth and righteousness.

And now, Mr. Speaker and gentlemen, for the exalted position of United States Senator, I submit to your consideration the name of the Hon. John P. Jones

The nomination was seconded by Mr. Norcross with the following remarks:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly:

It gives me great pleasure to second the nomination of that distinguished statesman, Hon. John P. Jones, for United States Senator from Nevada, and in seconding his nomination I desire to give some reasons why I believe his election, at this

time, should be made unanimous.

The people of the State of Nevada, almost without exception, have declared that the question of the free and unlimited coinage of silver is paramount to all others. The Silver Party of this State, which has been placed in control of all branches of State and county government, has for its only object the promotion of the silver cause, a question, the proper solution of which, we believe, lies at the foundation of the prosperity of this Nation and of the entire world.

We have put aside every minor question and issue, in order that all who believe

We have put aside every minor question and issue, in order that all who believe in the justice and necessity of our cause might unite and present to the enemy our front unbroken by petty questions; questions that pale into insignificance when compared with that greater one which touches the very perpetuity of our sacred institutions. This question of monetary reform is not limited by the narrow confines of Nevada, or even those of the United States. It is world-wide in its scope. Alone, we can expect nothing. We must unite with our sister States who believe as we do, and join forces with those who are the prime movers in our cause throughout the world. This idea was recognized by the great majority of the people of this State and forms the basic principle of the political party now dominant in Nevada.

We have laid aside all else for the sake of this one issue, and, by reason of this action, our influence has been felt the world over. Therefore, in the selection of a Senator to succeed the Honorable J. P. Jones, there is one question to be considered

which overshadows all others, and the answer to that qustion, for the time being at least, must be the answer to all others. That question is: "What effect will our action to-day have upon this question, that we have said shall be uppermost until it is justly settled?" If, as I have said, our action was but local in its effect, it might be answered in different ways. But no sooner had he commenced to speak than there was a change in the attitude of the Senate. Friend and foe came in to listen, until soon every Senator was in his seat, giving the speaker most earnest and undivided attention. A few hours later Senator Voorhees arose and asked if the Senator from Nevada would yield. Upon his doing so, Senator Voorhees said: "I desire to congratulate the Senator from Nevada upon his splendid contribution to the literature of this debate. The charm of what he has said has been enhanced by the personal affection all the members of this body bear to him. The Senator is tired and we are tired. We have been in continuous session for fifty-six hours out of the past seventy-seven, discharging a great public duty. I move to adjourn, in order that we at our best may hear the Senator at his best."

It is needless to say an adjournment was taken. If Senator Jones could command, under such circumstances, a tribute such as that from his fellow Senators, he must,

indeed, be worthy their esteem and our gratitude.

We, his constituents, would show ourselves unmindful and unappreciative of his great efforts in behalf of our most vital interest did we not return him to the halls of Congress by unanimous vote.

Mr. Oliver then placed in nomination Mr. William McMillan of

Storey county with appropriate remarks.

Mr. Hodgkinson seconded the nomination of Mr. McMillan. No further nominations appearing the nominations were declared closed, and the House proceeded to ballot for United States Senator with the following result:

I have the honor to report that I have approved Assembly Bill No. 45-An Act to provide for the deficiencies incurred in the building and furnishing of dormitories and for the construction of the annex for a mechanical building at the Nevada State University at Reno, Nevada.

I have witheld my approval of this bill until the last day allowed me by the

Constitution, for the following reasons:

First—Because the State Board of Examiners found upon examination of the bills for material for furnishing the dormitories that a portion of the appropriation was not expended for the purposes authorized by the Act of 1895 to provide for the building and furnishing of dormitories at the State University. For instance, a sofa costing \$68 in San Francisco, as is shown by the bill, can scarcely be deemed necessary furniture for a dormitory for either male or female students in an insti-

necessary furniture for a dorintory for either made or remain statuents in an insettution supported by the taxpayers of the State.

Second—Because the greater part of the deficiencies, amounting to over \$9,000 in the aggregate, were incurred in direct violation of the spirit and letter of the Act appropriating public funds for the building and furnishing of dormitories at the State University, approved February 15, 1895, section four of which Act contains the following: "And in no case shall a contract be entered into which shall exceed the sum of \$35,000 for the erection of said buildings and the furnishing of the same."

This makes it closely apparent that the deficiencies were incurred in direct violation. This makes it clearly apparent that the deficiencies were incurred in direct violation of the Act authorizing the construction and furnishing of the dormitories.

Third—The Board of Examiners found that expenditures were made and con-

tracts entered into without authority or direct ratification of the Board of Regents.

Fourth—While the bill provides for the issuance of bonds and the levying of taxes, no reference is made to either subject in its title as required by article four,

section seventeen, of the Constitution.

Regardless of these facts, to which, as Chief Executive, I deem it my duty, however unpleasant it may be, to call your attention, I think it incumbent upon me to approve the bill, as it passed your honorable body by unanimous vote and I do not consider it the province of the Executive to veto a measure under such circumstances. NEVADA STATE UNIVERSITY, PRESIDENT'S OFFICE, \[\] RENO, NEVADA, March 4, 1897.

To the Honorable the Assembly:

The undersigned, your petitioner, is a resident of the State of Nevada and President of the State University located at Reno, Nevada.

The statute makes it the duty of the President of the University under the direction of the Board of Regents to manage all matters connected with the institution, to employ teachers and servants, purchase supplies and make monthly statements

to employ teachers and servants, purchase supplies and make monthly statements to the Board of Regents of all receipts and expenditures supported by vouchers.

Your petitioner has read in the Nevada State Journal published at Reno, Nevada, and dated Thursday, March 4, 1897, under the head "University Bills Approved—A Sharp Message from the Governor," an article which includes a message from the Governor to your honorable body, which reports his approval of Assembly Bill No. 45, but which further gives four reasons why he, the Governor, withheld his approval of this bill until the last day allowed him by the Constitution. The first reason which the Governor gives is as follows: "Because the State Board of Examples of Standard of reason which the Governor gives is as follows: "Because the State Board of Examiners found upon examination of the bills for furnishing the dormitories that a portion of the appropriation was not expended for the purposes authorized by the Act of 1895. For instance, a sofa, costing sixty-eight dollars in San Francisco." The Governor's second reason is as follows: "Because the greater part of the deficiencies, amounting to over nine thousand dollars in the aggregate, were incurred in direct violation of the spirit and letter of the Act approved February 15 1805."

15, 1895."
The Governor's third reason is as follows: "The Board of Examiners found that expenditures were made and contracts entered into without authority or direct

ratification of the Board of Regents."

The Governor's fourth reason is as follows: "While the bill provides for the issuance of bonds and the levying of taxes, no reference is made to either subject in

its title, as required by article four, section seventeen of the Constitution of Nevada."

Inasmuch as the Board of Regents of the State University will not be in session prior to the adjournment of the Legislature, and, therefore, cannot take action with reference to the implied charges of mismanagement by the Governor, and inasmuch as your petitioner, the President of the University, is the executive officer of the Board of Regents and is charged by statute with the responsible duty of making, under the direction of the Board of Regents, all the expenditures connected with the management of said institution, and is, therefore, justly held responsible for any such mismanagement or extravagance of expenditure as the Governor sets forth clearly, though by implication, in his message to your honorable body, your petitioner, the President of the University, deems it a duty which he owes himself and the University and the Board of Regents, to set forth to your honorable body a specific denial of the truthfulness and integrity of the several reasons set forth by the Governor in his message to the Assembly; and your petitioner further asserts that the statements of the message are for the most part reckless and calculated to do injury.

Your petitioner affirms that the first reason set forth in the message is untrue, and asserts further that all the bills for furnishing the dormitories were severally approved "as correct and ought to be paid" by the State Board of Examiners, and

that each several bill bears the Governor's signature, approving the same. Your petitioner denies the correctness of the judgment given by the Governor

as his second reason.

Your petitioner avers that the statement under the third head is also wholly untrue, and that the Governor ought to have known that his statement under this head was untrue.

So far as the fourth reason is concerned, your petitioner asserts that while the question is one for the lawyers, yet he believes that the opinion of the Governor as to the constitutionality of the bill, because of defective title, cannot be established.

In view of the gravity of the charges implied in the Governor's message, touchng the administration of his duties by the President of the University, your petitioner requests most earnestly that he be permitted to appear before the Assembly in Committee of the Whole, and that he be interrogated most carefully upon any and all points connected with the deficiency bill known as Assembly Bill No. 45; and that the members of the State Board of Examiners, namely, the Governor, the Attorney-General, and the Secretary of State, be invited to be present and to participate in the interrogation.
