**FIRST DAY.**

CARSON CITY (Monday), January 16, 1905.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and the statute, the Assembly was called to order at 12 m. by Hon. W. G. Douglass, Secretary of State.

Rev. B. J. Darneille of Carson City, upon invitation, opened the House with prayer.

Mr. Holmes moved that W. D. Phillips of Washoe County be elected by acclamation as temporary Sergeant-at-Arms.

Carried.

Mr. Shier moved that H. E. Freudenthal of Lincoln County be elected temporary Chief Clerk.

Carried.

Mr. Patterson placed in nomination Mr. Platt of Ormsby County for temporary Speaker.

Mr. Cushing placed in nomination Mr. Cole of Nye County for temporary Speaker.

Upon motion the temporary Chief Clerk was instructed to call the roll, and Mr. Platt was duly elected temporary Speaker by the following vote:

Voting for Mr. Cole—Messrs. Blake, Clark of Lincoln, Coryell, Craze, Cushing, Ingalls, McCann, McCourt, McMahon, Regan, Sadler, Small, and Williams—13.

Not voting—Messrs. Cole and Platt—2.

Messrs. Kinney, McBride, and Cole were appointed a special committee to escort Mr. Platt to the chair.

The roll was called, and the following members answered to their names:

Mr. Coryell asked that leave of absence be granted Mr. Henderson, the absent member, until Tuesday morning.

Leave granted.

Mr. Jones moved that the Speaker appoint a committee of three to invite a Justice of the Supreme Court to administer the oath of office to the members-elect.

Carried.

Messrs. Jones, Staunton, and Smail were appointed as such committee.

The committee returned in due time and presented Associate Justice Norcross, who administered the oath to the members of the Assembly.

A vote of thanks was tendered Associate Justice Norcross for his services.

The election of permanent officers being in order, Mr. Patterson placed in nomination Mr. Platt of Ormsby County for permanent Speaker of the House.

Mr. Cushing placed in nomination Mr. Cole of Nye County for permanent Speaker of the House.

On roll call Mr. Platt of Ormsby County was elected by the following vote:

Mr. Platt having received the majority of the votes cast, was duly declared elected Speaker of the House by the temporary Chief Clerk.

Mr. Kinney nominated Mr. Dodge of Washoe County for Speaker pro tem.

There being no further nominations, Mr. Dodge was duly elected by acclamation.

Mr. Wright asked that a list of the officers and attachés selected in caucus be read.

Carried.

The list of caucus nominations was read.

Mr. Holmes moved that the caucus nominees be made the permanent officers and attachés of the Assembly of the Twenty-second Session of the Legislature of Nevada.

Carried.

The Clerk read the following nominations made in caucus:

Speaker, Samuel Platt of Ormsby; Speaker pro tem., E. R. Dodge of Washoe; Chief Clerk, H. E. Freudenthal of Lincoln; Assistant Chief Clerk, L. A. Green of Esmeralda; Minute Clerk, D. M. Broy of Eureka; Engrossing Clerk, Miss Dora Sheehan of Humboldt;

Copying Clerk, Miss Hattie Clark of Elko; Enrolling Clerk, Miss May Campbell of White Pine; Committee Clerk, A. Wallace of Douglas; Journal Clerk, A. Wise of Lander; Sergeant-at-Arms, W. D. Phillips of Washoe; Messenger, Wilson Thyges of Washoe; Page, C. L. Daves of Ormsby; Porter, Thomas Berryman of Lyon.

A committee from the Senate, consisting of Senators Roff, O'Kane, and Dangberg, appeared before the Assembly and informed that body that the Senate had organized and was ready for business.

Messrs. Brossemer, Patterson, and Coryell were appointed by the Speaker to invite a Justice of the Supreme Court to administer the oath of office to the attachés of the Assembly.

Chief Justice Fitzgerald appeared and administered the oath to all the attachés present, L. A. Green, Assistant Chief Clerk, being absent.

A vote of thanks was tendered Chief Justice Fitzgerald.

Mr. McBride moved that the rules of the Twenty-first Session of the Nevada Legislature be adopted.

Carried.

Messrs. Shier, Triplett, and Cole were appointed by the Speaker to inform the Senate that the Assembly was organized and ready for business.

Messrs. Kinney, Moorman, and Craze were appointed by the Speaker to wait on the Governor and inform him that the Assembly was organized and ready to receive communications.

Mr. Jacobsen moved that a committee of three, consisting of the Ormsby County Delegation, be instructed to wait on the clergy of Carson City, and invite them to officiate alternately as Chaplain at the sessions of the Assembly.

Carried.

Mr. Smith moved that a Committee on Mileage be appointed.

Carried.

Messrs. Smith, Gifford, and Ingalls were appointed as such committee.

Messrs. Kinney, Moorman, and Craze, the Special Committee appointed to wait on the Governor, reported that they had notified the Governor that the Assembly was organized and ready to receive communications.

On motion the committee was discharged.

Mr. Jones moved to adjourn until 11 o'clock, the 17th instant.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGES ON ASSEMBLY BILLS OF TWENTY-SECOND SESSION.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,  
CARSON CITY, NEVADA, March 25, 1903.

*To the Honorable the Secretary of State:*

I have the honor to deposit, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 118—An Act to protect the owners of livery and feed stables from being defrauded by false pretenses, etc.

My objections are, in the first place, that its provisions are too special in character, and, as compared with other branches of business, manifest partiality is shown. There are already laws to punish persons gaining money or goods upon false pretenses, and the crimes should be no greater or more emphatic by reason of a person deceiving a liveryman than if any other business man should suffer from the same cause. The fact that a person in good faith should hire a team from a liveryman, and should drive it a greater distance than first agreed upon, should make him subject to penal prosecution and fine, is not reasonable, because the person engaging the team may find it necessary to go farther than first anticipated when the team was hired. And, in reference to the intent to commit fraud in hire, it is very easy to conceive how it could happen that a person might be unable to settle the bill upon returning, no matter how honest his intentions were at the time of giving the order. This law would then open the way through the misdemeanor provided for to imprison a man by reason of his inability to pay a debt honestly contracted, which is not recognized in this State.

The law to prevent cruelty to animals is amply sufficient, and is no better provided for in this Act.

*To the Honorable the Secretary of State:*

I have the honor to deposit in your office, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 129—An Act fixing the salary of the Justice of the Peace in and for Reno Township, Washoe County, State of Nevada, and other matters relating thereto.

The object of this Act is to change the compensation of the office of Justice of the Peace in said township from a fee system, as heretofore and now existing, and under the provisions of which the Justice was duly elected, to that of a salaried office, the effect of which will in all probability reduce the compensation of the officer very materially and immediately.

While not denying the right of the Legislature to make such a change, I do think that it will operate unjustly upon an officer who, in the confidence of past conditions, made a campaign in the belief that the law would not be changed to his disadvantage during the term for which he may have been elected. If this Act had been made to take effect at the expiration of the term of office, I would willingly give it my approval. As it is, in my opinion, an injustice, I will deposit the measure unapproved, and permit the next Legislature to act after the people of the township can have the privilege of instructing the members as to the action to be taken thereon. It might be proper to state that I have a petition, numerously signed by leading citizens and taxpayers of the City of Reno, requesting that I withhold my approval of the measure.

The Governor's office will be used for Committee on State Institutions, Committee on Contingent Expenses, and Committee on Mines and Mining; the Governor's private office for Committee on Counties and County Boundaries, Committee on Trade and Manufactures, Committee on Education, Committee on Agriculture, and Committee on Internal Improvements.

Lieutenant-Governor Allen's rooms—Committee on Corporations and Railroads, Committee on Printing, Committee on Military and Indian Affairs.

State Treasurer Ryan's office—Committee on Ways and Means, and Assembly Committee on Public Lands.

State Controller Davis' office—Committee on Ways and Means, and Senate Committee on State Prison and Insane Asylum.

State Library reading room—Committee on Judiciary, Committee on Elections, Committee on Claims.

Supreme Court Room—Committee on Enrollment, Committee on Engrossment, Committee on Mileage, Committee on State Library.

Rooms in State Printing Office building—Committee on Public Morals, and Committee on Federal Relations.

This arrangement will leave the legislative chambers open, so that these committees need not conflict.

I would also name for your consideration Will Lee of Ormsby County for Porter of the Committee Rooms.

### MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,  
CARSON CITY, NEVADA, January 23, 1905.

*To the Honorable the Assembly:*

Owing to rush of business in preparing the biennial message, which has been delivered to your honorable body, two of the important industries of our State were unavoidably omitted, namely, "Fish and Game." It appeals to me that the American eagle is absolutely unprotected, as it is being shot, trapped and poisoned, and it is a fact that in a few years we will not be able to see a live eagle, emblematic of the stamp on the coin of the United States.

It is recommended that a stringent law be enacted protecting the life of the king of all birds, which is not a disturber of the game birds of the country, and of which our Nation feels proud, as it stands next to the American flag, and is the pride of our people.

It is also suggested that this become both a National and State law, as many States have failed to take this matter under consideration in a manner to be effectual.

## SPECIAL ORDER OF THE DAY—ELECTION OF UNITED STATES SENATOR.

Mr. Staunton placed in nomination Hon. George S. Nixon of Humboldt County, with the following remarks:

*Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly:*

Words cannot express my sincere feelings of pride that have overcome me to-day, as quite unexpectedly the high honor has fallen upon myself to place in nomination our worthy candidate.

And, Mr. Speaker, his experience in life in this State alone has been such that when any legislation shall come before that body of which he will doubtless become an honored member, upon a question of the legislation of tariff, or even on the statutes concerning mining or general legislation, the discussion of our more than two million miles of railroads in this Union, or concerning the great waterway from the Atlantic to the Pacific, which will shorten our route from San Francisco to New York by more than fourteen thousand miles, he will bring to the consideration of these questions experience which will enable him to give them full consideration.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the people and the delegation from Washoe County, I take pleasure in seconding the nomination of the Honorable George S. Nixon.

Mr. Smail also seconded the nomination of Hon. John Sparks, and addressed the Assembly as follows:

*Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Assembly:*

I do not desire to take much of your time eulogizing the man whom the Democrats have nominated for United States Senator in any extended remarks, but I do desire to say that it gives me great pleasure to second the nomination of Nevada's grandest man, Hon. John Sparks. Never before in the political history of this State has any party placed before this honorable body a man whose interests have been more closely identified with those of the people. John Sparks is a plain, honest man. If the embodiment of honor, justice and integrity is essential to the election of a United States Senator, then by all means John Sparks should represent Nevada in this exalted office.

Like my friend from Humboldt, I, too, am a Nevada boy. I was born almost in the shadow of this building, and in the years to come, when my hair has turned to silvery gray, I shall look back and renew the memory of this day and consider the opportunity of seconding the nomination of John Sparks as one of the proudest moments of my life.

I do not presume from the remarks of the Republican members that John Sparks will represent us in the United States Senate. I do not think that the odor of sagebrush will accompany him to Washington, but I do know the odor of no discredit has followed him through life, and that, if he should go, the odor of honor would be upon his breast.

I again state that I take great pleasure in seconding the nomination of Hon. John Sparks.

*To the Honorable the Assembly:*

I have the honor to return to your honorable body without my approval Assembly Bill No. 2—An Act to provide for the purchase of grounds at Carson City, Ormsby County, Nevada, and for the erection thereon of a Governor's mansion, to be used as the home of the executive.

My objections are as follows:

In the first place, necessary appropriations and deficiencies are now approaching the limit allowed by law, as shown by the several reports of State officers and different committees of the Legislature, which appeal to greater interests of the people of this State than a Governor's mansion. Appropriations should be made and sustained for the benefit of all the people of this State before purchasing or building a mansion for any officer of the State.

It is my earnest desire that the Legislature in its wisdom will sustain these objections and prevent the increase of the rate of taxation, and, if possible, reduce such rate for the benefit of taxpayers who bear the burden.

Our State is growing in wealth and population, but in my judgment this luxury cannot be considered necessary at this time. We have had good and efficient Governors who have served the State with honor and distinction, and have lived in homes without cost to the State exceeding the salary appropriated by law, and the rule can be continued to great advantage at this time.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,  
CARSON CITY, NEVADA, March 2, 1905.

*To the Honorable the Assembly:*

I have the honor to return, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 8—An Act to prohibit the purchase of intoxicating liquors, drugs or other intoxicating substances by Indians.

My objections are as follows:

First—Almost all the Indians residing in the State are wards of the General Government, and are controlled by Federal authority in so far as the liquor question is concerned between the Indians and the whites. This policy has prevailed for nearly a century, and has been strictly enforced by the Federal Government and State authorities.

I do not feel warranted in interfering with the Federal Government's methods. The United States District Attorney for this State advises me that a State law such as proposed will materially interfere with a rigid enforcement of the Federal law.

Second—If this bill becomes a law, the Indian purchaser and white seller being criminally chargeable, it is certainly probable that no evidence could be obtained to establish the guilt of either.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,  
CARSON CITY, NEVADA, March 8, 1905.

*To the Honorable the Assembly:*

I have the honor to return to your honorable body without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 47—An Act regulating the assessment and taxation of banks and of the shares of stock therein.

My objections to the passage of this bill are that it is special in its application to banks. If the shares of a bank are assessable, it is now the duty of the Assessors to assess them without any special law to that effect. The State Board of Assessors did not include this kind of property in the list of valuations, and it is therefore left to the discretion of the several County Assessors. Quoting from the law as it now stands, I do not see wherein this bill can be an improvement. Section 6, 1082, Compiled Laws, provides:

"All capital loaned, invested or employed in trade, commerce or business whatsoever, the capital stock of all corporations (except the capital stock of corporations, organized for mining purposes) companies, associations, ferries, or individuals doing business or having an office within this State; the money, property and effects of every kind, except real estate of all banks, banking institutions or firms, bankers, money lenders and brokers, and all property of whatever kind or nature not included in the term 'real estate' as said term is defined in this Act; *provided*, that gold or silver-bearing ores, quartz or minerals from which gold or silver is extracted when in the hands of the producers thereof, shall not mean nor be taken to mean, nor be listed and assessed under the term 'personal property,' as used in this section of this Act, but are especially excepted therefrom and shall be listed, assessed and taxed as provided by law."

The term "full cash value" means the amount at which the property would be appraised if taken in payment of a just debt due from a solvent debtor.

A thorough examination of this bill convinces me that no improvement has been made over the statute now in force.

Banks are essential to the convenience of the public and should pay their just share of taxes. And they should have equal protection before the law with all other corporations or companies existing. Developments are being made in this State wherein banks are benefactors and help to build up the State by assisting new and remote districts.

I have the honor to return to your honorable body, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 38—An Act providing assistance for maintaining an exhibit of mineral and agricultural resources of the State.

This corporation could, under the provisions set forth, enter into a banking, real estate or loan association, to do and transact any or all business now enjoyed by such institutions, contrary to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Nevada.

It appears to me that the fourteen counties of this State should have equal rights in the direct benefits of this law creating an obligation which is only beneficial to one county and one corporation mentioned in this Act. If the Chamber of Commerce is to be sustained as a State institution, it should be located at the State Capital.

I have the honor to return to your honorable body, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 72—An Act making it unlawful for any person to wear the badge, lapel-button or

other recognized and established insignia of any lodge or secret society, unless entitled to wear the same under the rules and regulations of such order or society.

This bill, if it becomes a law, may be the means of subjecting innocent persons who have no knowledge of the insignia of any order and who might desire to purchase and wear emblems suitable to their choice. Men, women and children have a God-given right to wear any or all colors which will gratify and please themselves. If applying to any member of an order with intent to procure aid by imposition, the law as it now stands will punish for obtaining money under false pretenses. Further, if a person cannot take the test, he can be exposed and detected by any member of the order to which the emblem belongs.
